BOARD MEMBERS PRESENT

Lisa Hale, Dan Sloan, Terri Dunlap, Nichole Bogen, Patty Beutler, Joe Shaw, present. A quorum was present. Jackie Ostrowicki arrived later.

CALL TO ORDER AND ANNOUNCEMENT OF POSTING OF OPEN MEETINGS ACT

President Shaw called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. and announced the Open Meetings Law was posted and available for review.

APPROVAL OF AGENDA

Shaw noted that the Agenda/Meeting Notice was posted according to the Open Meetings Act of the State of Nebraska. Shaw asked for a motion to approve the Agenda as posted. Beutler so moved. Sloan seconded. There was no discussion. ROLL CALL VOTE: Gerteisen, Hale, Beutler, Dunlap, Shaw, Sloan – AYE. Motion carried 6-0.

Approval of Monthly Recap of Expenditures for July, 2024

Treasurer Hale shared that the total Operational expenditures were \$1,014,519.91. Expenditures from other funds totaled \$32,931.57 for Total Expenditures of \$1,047,451.48. Hale moved approval of the report. Dunlap seconded. **ROLL CALL VOTE:** Beutler, Dunlap, Shaw, Sloan, Gerteisen, Hale — AYE. Motion carried 6-0.

SPECIAL COMMITTEE REPORTS

Foundation Executive Director Report

Gail McNair provided invitations to the upcoming Spelling Bee, reminding all that spellers and cheerleaders are still needed. President Shaw volunteered to be a speller and McNair promised to sponsor him. She reported that

the 2024 membership drive ended in October, and brought in \$58,346.70, nearly \$6,000 more than last year but with four fewer donors. Regarding Book Nooks, September was a record-breaking month, bringing in \$2,800 from the six libraries, including nearly \$1,200 from Gere alone. Brief discussion followed. Ostrowicki arrived at this time.

NEW BUSINESS

Mail Management Agreement

Director Wieber explained this is an agreement with Mail Management Services who provide the library's daily delivery of mail, books and office materials between libraries every day except Sundays. He reported that we've been with this company for at over six years and have received good service. The one difference this year is an increase in cost requested by the company in order to pay the delivery driver a competitive wage. He explained that while the ask is more than what we'd normally be happy with, it's understandable in the current hiring environment. He also noted that if cost continued to rise, the contract could be re-bid. The new annual amount is not to exceed \$88,000 for the next year. Beutler moved approval. Ostrowicki seconded.

Discussion: Sloan noted that when the Security contract asked for an increase for guard wages, they included a mechanism to show that cost was passed through to their staff. He asked if there was any such plan to verify these increases with Mail Management. Discussion followed, and it was determined that while Purchasing made no change in the contract language for this year, asking for verification now and a change in language for next year would be appropriate. ROLL CALL VOTE: Ostrowicki, Dunlap, Shaw, Sloan, Gerteisen, Hale, Beutler – AYE. Motion carried 7-0.

Walt Branch Report

Director Wieber shared that at the Nebraska Library Association conference in Kearney the second week in October he attended the excellent presentation put on by Walt staff, Librarian Vicki Clarke and Library Service Associate Liz Claymon about their program, Circle of Friends. He invited them to give a condensed version of their presentation to the Board. He commended the pair on the program that not only engages community members, but provides them an opportunity to make connections interact with one another.

Clarke and Claymon shared that Circle of Friends developed after staff observed that this was a community of adults with disabilities who visited the library, often with their staff, but who weren't making full use of the library and all its offerings. Given the library's stated mission to increase accessibility to library services, staff was inspired to look around at library offerings and adapt them to meet the needs of this community. They identified a lack of opportunities for interaction between adults who are being served by different organizations and who rarely, if ever have the opportunity to gather together. They also identified the fact that staff turnover is high, due to which maintaining relationships between staff and the adults they serve can suffer.

This program provides folks (accompanied by their support person) with activities like music, art, games and puzzles they can participate in, alone or together, adapted to their abilities, their likes and their age. The program information was shared directly with caregivers and tailored to work with their schedules. The programs are offered at times when staff know the service providers are available to provide transportation and supervision. The program is marketed directly within the building, online, and Claymon went on Channel 10/11's First at Four program to promote the program. The number of participants continues to increase.

Walt's program schedule has increased from bimonthly to weekly to accommodate increasing numbers of participants, and Gere Library is now offering a similar program on a different day to accommodate more folks' schedules. Benefits have included peers reconnecting with others they went to school with or participated in other

programs with. Their staff are making connections and communicating between agencies, and connections with library staff have improved as well. Discussion followed.

Director Wieber congratulated Wyatt Packard on his new position as Director of Walt branch. Packard gave a brief report on Walt staff, circulation and programming. He highlighted Walt's Baby Storytimes, Makerspace, Teen Dice Guild, and encouraged all to view and vote for Walt's annual pumpkin decorating competition.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

The creativity and themes displayed in Walt's annual pumpkin decorating is remarkable – please go check out the pumpkins.

ASSISTANT LIBRARY DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Assistant Director Glaesemann shared a hiring report – the system is much closer to being fully staffed. There are three currently vacant positions, and multiple positions working through the hiring process. She gave an overview of staff who presented at the NLA conference in addition to Claymon and Clarke. Heath Gewecke gave a presentation on increasing diversity in hiring and received good feedback. Packard and retired Youth Services Director Vicki Wood gave a presentation on Intellectual Freedom.

Glaesemann reported on the Southern Heights Food Forest program – a publicly available space for residents to have plots to grow food plants available for forage, and announced an upcoming collaboration with them at Eiseley Branch library. Related education and programming will be held at the library.

LIBRARY DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Director Wieber reported on the previous night's One Book One Lincoln finale featuring Amanda Peters, the winning author. One hundred seventy-five people attended the program at Lincoln High School. Librarian Jen Jackson interviewed the author on stage and the back and forth was relaxed, interesting and enjoyable. Brief discussion followed.

Wieber shared useful information about the committees on which Board members have been assigned to serve, and advised that quarterly meeting dates will be sent out shortly. Brief discussion followed. He shared plans for upcoming arts collaborations at the library with Lincoln Arts Council.

There was no public comment.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 7:06 p.m.

NEW BUSINESS

*Bennett Martin Elevator Replacement Agreement with Kone not to exceed \$316,000, **APPROVAL NEEDED**

Contracts over \$50,000 are brought to the library board for approval. This CIP project to replace the 4-floor elevator at BMPL is slated for approximately March 2025. It was put out to bid in September, and we received 3 proposals, with Kone the lowest at \$316,000. Facilities Superintendent Dan Miller is coordinating other, required work needed for the project including installation of drywall in the elevator control room, wiring for wifi, and adding film to the elevator shaft windows.

Director's Report for October 2024

The first season of **ballot boxes** at LCL locations were mostly uneventful, however we did experience occurrences of poll watchers who caused uneasiness for library visitors and at times, staff. We'll gather and communicate our experiences with the Election Commissioner for their awareness to assess and evaluate and react to any circumstances involving safety or operational concerns. The Commissioner estimated that approximately 45% of voters dropped off ballots at boxes or voted early at their office. We experienced no issues (or reported issues) involving the recently installed security cameras at boxes.

The October 9-11 Annual Conference for the Nebraska Library Association in Kearney saw several LCL staff involved with presentations or acting in leadership roles. Team members Heath Gewecke, Liz Claymon, Vickie Clarke, Scott Scholz, Brenda Ealey, and Wyatt Packard all demonstrated their expertise or experiences to grateful attendees from across the state.

The library's new **strategic plan** is a guiding document created with the help of staff systemwide who identified what's important to best serve our community now and in the immediate future. Examples of suggested activities already in place to help move forward priorities like "Communicating our Offerings" and "Strengthening our Potential" include ways to improve internal and external communications. To provide better transparency and awareness of activities, decisions, funding, etc., we've begun a quarterly all-staff **Town Hall** on Zoom, as well as the "**Biweekly Staff Bulletin**" delivered every other Monday where we announce new staff, best practices, and updates on services. "**Another Chapter**" is the bimonthly public facing newsletter that expands on programs and services and emphasizes library news that patrons should know about. We're also working on a **partnership with KZUM** to deliver 1-minute weekly blurbs advertising programs, and a monthly half-hour podcast where we talk about the library, interview our partners, and share great news on the great things happening at LCL.

The City's efforts to improve sustainability practices now include a "**Green Team**" made up of ambassadors from every department. Green Team ambassadors will educate fellow staff on how the City of Lincoln is building a more resilient community and how staff can contribute to City-wide sustainability and climate goals by integrating environmentally beneficial choices into their work. By communicating with their division or department to promote environmental awareness, share tips, and encourage sustainability best practices, the Green Team will cultivate a community of staff who are mindful of their social, economic, and environmental impacts and who are empowered to affect change. The program will be piloted for a year, starting on November 1st, 2024, and will be led by the sustainability team in the Mayor's Office." I'm happy to report that the Library's

ambassadors on the Green Team for a two-year term are Lauren Eastman, Matt Norsworthy, and Megan Peda.

Assistant Director Jodene Glaesemann is coordinating an **accessibility audit** of library facilities and resources, working with local consultants who will assist in identifying ways to ensure our spaces are inclusive for our residents. Our intention with the review is to establish a list of priority actions that are achievable and make a difference. The Foundation for Lincoln City Libraries' Annual Spelling Bee on October 30 was a well-attended, and very fun event. The Foundation's Nebraska Literary Heritage Association (NLHA) put on the event, with proceeds to benefit the Library and specifically, the Heritage Room of Nebraska Authors. The competition was intense, yet the atmosphere –aided by emcee John Bayer—was festive and light!

Examples of the Library's Vision and Mission in our daily work:

- Educare Family Night was held on the same evening as Eiseley's regular Preschool Storytime. Prior to the program, families were able to share a meal at the library and then visit each service desk for library information and sign up for cards. Eighty-five families and staff members from Educare attended. The final portion of the evening was Preschool Storytime open to all patrons.
- During the Lincoln Public Schools fall break, Karrie S. and Christina S. [NESU] hosted
 a special youth event called *Dance It Out*. Christina handled the technology piece,
 and Karrie led the 13 participants in a fun-filled 30 minutes of dancing and
 exercising. This is a great event, because it gets kids up and moving. It is also a great
 event, because it requires little planning or preparation by Karrie since she has done
 it in the past.
- Lisa W. [Walt Branch] helped a customer look up voter registration information and printed forms so she and her husband could register in person at the Election Commission before the deadline

- Scott S. in the Polley Music Library reported "This month, we had an event aimed at kids featuring Lincoln world-renowned instrument inventor Jay Kreimer. The original plan was to let the little ones play a range of the instruments Jay uses in his own work, and then show them how to think about sound and make their own simple experimental instruments. As it turned out, all of the kids (and many of their parents!) were so excited to play with the instruments, we decided to just let them have an hour of self-discovery and they played together and alone and learned a lot about music and the nature of sound by doing it themselves. In particular, I was struck by how inventive everyone was using Jay's "sound table" device, which amplifies very quiet objects placed onto its surface. There were about 20 attendees."
- Vicki C. [Walt] shared that on "Halloween night a young woman brought a book to the checkout counter that she was obviously very excited to have found. I was equally excited as I scanned it as I had recently read and loved the same book (Shark Heart by Emily Habeck). It had been recommended by one of her favorite Podcasters. Then she saw on the cover that Anthony Doerr blurbed it the enthusiasm was palpable. We had a lively conversation about it and then I told her this book must be perfect for her because the book jacket perfectly complemented the outfit she had on. It was definitely a treat to end Halloween evening."
- On 10/16/2024, Jodi R. helped represent LCL during Project Connect Lincoln held at Pinnacle Bank Arena. According to the event website, "Project Connect Lincoln is a one day, one stop event for members of our community facing homelessness or near-homelessness." Attendees can access a wide variety of assistance including medical care, haircuts, employment services, housing assistance, and even bicycle repair. Of this event, Jodi wrote, "I had the opportunity to work with Ali B. [Youth Services Coordinator] & Erin S. (from Gere Branch) at Pinnacle Bank Arena for *Project Connect Lincoln* on the afternoon of October 16. There was a busy and steady stream of people throughout the afternoon. Many people signed up for library cards or filled out fine forgiveness forms while there. We advocated for our library system as offering free Wi-Fi, storytimes for kids, and gave out many copies of *The Library Lineup*. Copies of QR codes were available to assist with Homework Help. The Library booth being placed next to Lincoln Literacy was helpful, as there was a strong connection between the two agencies, making it convenient for people who could benefit from the services of both.
- Amanda T-S and Ronda H [Gere-South] hosted 5 meetings of Circle of Friends at Gere with 142 attending. Amanda shared this from the meeting on the 2nd, when they did ghost painting and bookmarks: "I had a lot more people want to paint than I expected! I was worried they might be intimidated, but it seemed like they really enjoyed it.
- Staff members from the Northeast Service Unit [NESU] were out in full force during October 2024. Eight of NESU's 12 classified staff members represented LCL at 6 youth outreach events this month. Four of these events took place at elementary schools designated by Lincoln Public Schools [LPS] as Title I Schools (*). According to

the LPS website, these schools have high levels of poverty, and they receive federal funding to help close the achievement gap between low-income students and other students. NESU employees spoke with a combined total of nearly 2,800 individuals.

- Jodene Glaesemann and Lisa Olivigni met with R.J Vega from City Resources and Lisa Guill from the Asian Community & Cultural Center and Coordinator of Welcoming Communities. They wanted to use the library meeting rooms for an upcoming program Civic Connections. Its goal is to provide newcomers to Lincoln an opportunity to meet some people from City/County Departments and City/County Officials. We were glad to offer the space but also offered to introduce the participants to the what Eiseley and LCL have to offer. We'll be following a structure similar to how we run school nights, with a passport to guide participants through the program. This program will be held at Eiseley on Thursday, November 21 from 5:30-7:00.
- Araya W. [Gere-South] shared this interaction: "A patron approached me at the circ desk and told me they were really sad because they had checked out Moonlight (DVD) from Eiseley but the disc had a huge scratch on the back and they couldn't watch it. They asked me if we had any LGBT movies or a Gere copy of Moonlight, and I looked in the catalog and found that we have a BingeBox with LGBT movies including Moonlight. I showed the patron where to find the BingeBox, which contained 6 movies, and they asked if we had any other BingeBoxes with LGBT material and we ended up finding one with 4 documentaries. The patron was super happy that we had them available and conveniently grouped by subject in BingeBoxes."
- Jodi R. [NESU] reported about the Cross the Line Church *Trunk or Treat*, "Nancy was able to initiate many conversations with parents & caretakers while I kept up with the steady stream of guests at our library booth. Having some library bookbags was also very helpful. Kids with no bag, or who were needing to share a bag with a sibling were so grateful for them. Having the library advertised on the bag was a good way to market our library system."
- Susan S. and Lisa O. [Eiseley-Williams] staffed the Trunk or Treat at Arnold Elementary School. There were 300 people in attendance. It was a great opportunity to promote Williams to the community, and later Kate K., Selene S. and Melody S. promoted library services at the Trunk or Treat at the Fallbrook YMCA. There were 900 people in attendance.
- Laurie J. [Walt] led many great teen programs this month, including a spooky-themed Manga/Anime Club, two Dice Guild programs, and a Dice Guild One Shot where "we played the table-top RPG Honey Heist. The first hour was spent on character creation and the next two on infiltration of a summer (fall break) camp to steal their honey. It was instant chaos but they got their honey in the end and 'defeated' the villain."

- Diane V. [Gere-South] hosted 9 sessions of Baby Storytime with 271 attending and themes of Fall Walk; Squirrels; Leaves; and Pumpkins. Diane said: "We spent the month whooshing scarves like falling leaves and playing Ring Around the Pumpkin. A fun thing that has happened in Baby Storytime on Tuesdays is three Portuguese speaking families independently started coming to storytime and were very excited to find each other and have since exchanged numbers to get together outside of storytime."
- Deanne J. shared that she "helped an elderly patron who was looking for books written by Carl Jung. He apologized for being a nuisance (which he was not) and when he checked out the ones we had he told me I was helpful and to 'continue to provide inspiration to others as you have to me."
- Virtual Services reported "It's not unusual for us to get occasional OverDrive support requests from people in other locations called "Lincoln," such as Lincoln, Rhode Island; Lincoln, Illinois; or Lincoln City, Oregon. But I believe this is the first time we've received *three* such requests in the same month from Lincoln, England.
- The Tech Time Staff at Gere helped 10 unique patrons during an equivalent of 20 half-hour appointments. Of these, 3 needed assistance with digital library services. Leanne D. shared: "I was working with one woman, helping her set up her new Chromebook, and she mentioned that she had arthritis and had a hard time typing. I showed her the microphone search feature in Chromebook and she was thrilled!
- Yoel S-T [Gere-South] was at Lincoln Senior Square Apartments representing Lincoln City Libraries for a Resource Fair on the 29th. Yoel shared that they signed up 6 new library accounts and issued one replacement card and also had one individual sign up for home outreach on the spot! Yoel shared this comment from one resident, Linda, who has an Aide that takes her to the library: "The best thing I have is going to the library. I don't know what I'd do without it. It keeps me sane."
- Meagan M. reported that she "assisted a grandmother over the phone with renewals. She mentioned that her grandson, whom she brings to story times, had fallen suddenly and severely ill and that they had not been able to make their usual visits. While she said he was improving, there was still a road to recovery before them as a family, with her having to make trips to Omaha on the daily. I mentioned that despite not be able to physically visit the library, that there are digital options available, if she was interested in having something to occupy her during her travels or if she wanted to enjoy stories with her grandson while at the hospital. She had not been aware of our Libby, Hoopla and Tumblebooks apps and was very glad to learn about them, citing that they seemed easy to access and would be 'a welcome distraction from point A to point B' while he is recovering in the hospital."
- Heritage Room Librarian Amber S. attended the Nebraska Celebration of Books on October 12th doing outreach with Jen J. This was the first year for this event in this

format, combining the previous book festival with the annual Nebraska Book Awards. It was well attended, and theyl spoke to several people about the Heritage Room, the Nebraska Author database, and how to donate books to the Heritage Room.

- South Branch Library received the following note from a customer: "...After losing my job & the death of my mother, I spiraled into a pretty dark place as I lived out of my and looked for some remnants of hope. During these last 4 ½ months, I frequently came into this branch library to charge my phone, use the restroom, fill up my water bottle, feel a bit safe, and use the computers to job search. I am grateful that one of those job searches has led to me getting a job in Hastings...Thanks for all you do to make this library a place of transformation. Gratefully, ..."
- Teentober is one of Susan S.'s (Eiseley-Williams) favorite time of year. She visits numerous middle and high schools and promotes the young adult collection to students via book talks. There just isn't enough time to fit it all into October, so she'll have some sessions in November. In October, she visited Northeast High School, Standing Bear High School, Culler Middle School, North Star Highschool, East High School, Southeast High School and Lincoln High School.
- Lisa O. (Eiseley-Williams) reported: "One of our frequent patrons stopped me on the floor recently to let me know how much she appreciated Eiseley staff. She had been looking for a new job and couldn't praise the staff enough about all of the help they gave her updating her resume. "I even sent my resume in through one of your databases and got feedback on it!" She was very happy to tell me that she had gotten a new job at one of the local hospitals and she said she was very excited to begin her new job and learn about her new responsibilities. She did actually say "I couldn't have done it without the staff here at Eiseley! They all deserve a raise!" It is quite incredible to know that library staff can make such an incredible impact on a patron's life."
- Jessica S. organized the annual Walt Literary Pumpkin Parade. "From October 1st through the 15th, all ages of the public were invited to bring in their own pumpkin decorated like their favorite book or book character without puncturing, cutting or carving the gourds. The community could then view and vote for their favorite creation in each of the 4 age categories between October 16 through October 22nd. Winners were given a 3-D printed pumpkin trophy, a place ribbon and a goody bag. Each participant received a coupon for one free item from the Walt Book Nook courtesy of the Foundation for Lincoln City Libraries. We had about 86 pumpkin entries ranging from age 3 to 46 years of age." A picture of the winning pumpkins is at the end of this report.
- On October 8, the Mayor, City Council members, Library Board Members and other dignitaries were on hand with illustrator, Chloe Burgett, at South Library for a press conference highlighting her mural on the west wall of the library. Then on the 29th Chloe Burgett and Andy Peterson (Lux Center for the Arts) were back at South

Library to add a couple of Squirrels from the mural to an inside wall. The project was funded by the Country Club Neighborhood Association and coordinated by the Lux Center for the Arts. The project invited the community to be involved and help with painting the panels for the mural.

Lincoln City Libraries Polley Music Library Annual Report 2024 Submitted by Scott Scholz, Polley Music Librarian

The Polley Music Library completed 42 years of service to the public in September 2024. This document will highlight services provided in 2024, and describe plans for services in 2025. We enjoyed a great year with continued expansion of the diversity and quantity of Polley programming.

Highlights FY 2023-24 (September 2023-August 2024)

Public Service/Staffing

The Polley Music Library catalogued music collection remained available to the public throughout the 2023-24 year, with direct access to the shelves any time Bennett Martin Public Library (BMPL) was open. As in previous years, Polley offered twenty hours of public service per week provided by the Polley Music Librarian, but I assisted the public as needed during any other hours I was in the library. In addition to visitors to Polley, many patrons continued to request materials by telephone, email, social media, and through the Lincoln City Libraries (LCL) website, habits that are likely to continue. Similar to other years, many holds were delivered to other branches for more convenient pickup.

Collections

I ordered just under 300 new books this year. Our periodical subscriptions remained the same. The Music Online databases provided by Polley saw noticeably more use this year, which was interesting to note, and CD usage systemwide stayed very stable as well.

Guitars and ukuleles continue to be very popular circulation items, and we seem to have found a good balance of regular circulation with minimal holds for these items. I continue to do basic repairs to instruments as needed, and they're all holding up well.

Donations to Polley stayed at about the same levels as last year. As usual, most were passed through for eventual use at book sales, but we did add a few interesting titles.

Outreach/Collaboration

Collaborations between Polley and other organizations achieved some exciting results this year. By partnering with Lincoln Arts Council, we were able to bring Music Studio LNK to the library for a series of summer events for kids, and we also worked with the Crossroads Music Festival, hosting two of their events this year (see more detail on both of these in the programming/events section below). I'm especially excited about the work done by the Music District Advisory Group this year: our first major project, a rehearsal/recording/performance multipurpose space that will be called the "Music Box" is now under construction on the 1st floor of the Eagle parking garage across the street from BMPL. Using the vacant space provided by the city, the Downtown Lincoln Association secured grants to move forward with building and furnishing the space based on input from the advisory group.

In November, I did an immersive tour experience for a class of 18 at Nebraska Wesleyan called "Off the Beaten Path: Exploring with Multiple Intelligences." Students learned about the history and scope of the Polley Music Library, as well as the many kinds of resources that can be found here.

In February, I featured a display in the Polley area in collaboration with the Rhythm and Blues Preservation Society, an organization from New Jersey that organized an international call for having displays about the history of black music, drawing from a shared curation list. Almost all of the participants were academic music libraries—we were one of the first public music libraries to participate.

I gave a Bethany Book Talk in April, where I focused on 10 of the most interesting music-related books from the last year. We had 6 attendees.

In August, I spoke at the Foundry's monthly member lunch group, giving them an overview of the history of Polley and what we have to offer. There were 18 attendees.

I continued producing the weekly Polley Music Library show, which airs twice each weekend on 89.3 FM KZUM and is archived on Mixcloud: https://www.mixcloud.com/Polley Music Library/. I focused mostly on booktalk show formats this year, featuring books from the Polley collection about a diverse range of musical styles and backgrounds, followed by relevant listening examples. We passed the 250 program mark this year. As mentioned last year, the show is available now for public/community radio syndication through the PRX platform, and in the last year, three stations have aired episodes: Raven Radio in Sitka, Alaska aired 18 episodes, Radio St. Pete in Florida aired one, and KECG in San Francisco has recently started to air episodes as well.

I continued to contribute three "recommended reading" book reviews for the LCL Staff
Recommendations website each month, adding to a nice body of Polley-related recommendations. This
has temporarily ceased, however, as there isn't a section for the staff recommendations on the new
library website. If this resource is added back to the website at some point, it will be easy to produce
more of these by simply editing radio scripts.

I produced one or two e-newsletters each month, highlighting new radio and programming, upcoming Polley events, our songwriting club and guitar lending programs, and new book arrivals.

I only produced one video this year, and it was for internal purposes: it explored censorship of music in recent decades, a kind of cousin to banned books week issues. It was used as a part of "make-up" educational opportunities for staff who weren't able to attend last year's in-service day.

As mentioned in the previous two years, I continue to feel slightly hamstrung with the city's 2022 Social Media Policy that eliminated the Polley Facebook and Twitter pages. Now that Polley is hosting so many events, it's especially important to get the word out through as many media formats as possible. While posts are seen by more eyes overall through the main LCL social media pages, they're not necessarily seen by the same audience who liked or followed the Polley accounts, simply due to the way social media algorithms create information bottlenecks in an increasingly content-dense environment.

I also tended to create event pages a month before events so I could hype them several times before they occurred, but now they sometimes drop within days (or even mere hours) of events occurring, due to technical issues with Facebook scheduling for the many events in the library system. If we were back to individual program social media pages, some of those problems could be reduced or eliminated. I hope the city reconsiders this policy in the future.

Programming/Events

We continue to expand the number of events hosted by Polley. We reached a new peak this year with 19 events, not counting the monthly songwriting/composing club. While my general goal is to host around one event per month on average, we were able to work with some partners to add additional programs at minimal expense. I also tried to mix performance-oriented events with others aimed more at improving skills related to music. This year also marks the first time that I added programs focused on children—previous Polley events have always been for adults or families.

In September, we had a lecture/show-and-tell about synthesizers called "Synthtober," led by Omaha synthesist Aaron Gumm. He brought lots of synths to show the basics of how they produce sound and how designs have evolved over time, and fielded lots of questions from the audience of 20. He ended up staying for an extra hour to continue addressing questions and allowing people to come up and try the instruments themselves.

In October, we had a performance and presentation by Lincoln's own *dream journal*, the solo project of J. Bockoven. He performed some of his music, explained how he creates, manipulates, and builds loops in a live setting, and even had members of the audience come up to try it themselves. In his talking about playing at Polley, he reflected on the importance of this resource in his own upbringing: "When I was a kid, this library literally saved me. My dad always took me weekly, and I would grab any CD and any music books I could. I discovered a world of music I never knew existed. Early on, I found techno, house, folk, hip hop, indie rock, and so much more. They laid a foundation for the type of music I make now. 10 year old me would be so proud right now!" There were 16 attendees.

In November, we had a "How to get your band seen: Press kits, websites, and booking!" event with Lincoln musician and promoter Mike Semrad. This was held at Walt branch in the makerspace area. Semrad was able to speak to many issues facing bands and artists who are just getting started, trying to reach more fans and venues. We had five attendees.

December featured a performance by Kearney, NE multimedia artist Patrick Hargon, who discussed how he searches for "the sounds that sounds make" through various kinds of effects, synthesis, and controlled pitch sets, and he performed some of his music in a trio setting. We had 10 attendees.

We were visited by Andrew Borakove from Lincoln's unique company Gongs Unlimited in February. He and his staff brought a wide variety of gongs from around the world to demonstrate the differences in sounds they can produce, as well as some singing bowls. They had the audience gather in an area in the middle of these instruments to experience a short "sound healing," one of the common uses for collections of gongs and bowls today, and Borakove discussed additional uses for them, including musical, meditative, and ritualistic applications, from ancient traditions to modern-day innovations. We had 12 attendees.

In March, Lincoln musician Luke Norse performed and discussed the various elements of his long-running Multidimensional Cowboy project, ranging from work with a variety of percussion instruments to flutes to electronics manipulated with effects pedals, and simple singer/songwriter arrangements with banjo. We had 14 attendees.

We hosted a series of three "Secrets of the Song" events with Lincoln songwriter Nick Vaccaro in March, April and May. Each focused on the unique approach of a particular notable songwriter. March featured Dolly Parton, April was Bob Marley, and May was Lin-Manuel Miranda.

On May 12, I hosted a "Surrealist Games" event, which started with a PowerPoint presentation of the games that Dada and Surrealist art movements introduced to the world, followed by participants trying out visual, literary, and musical versions of the games themselves. We had 10 attendees who had a ton of fun, and this may become a regular event once or twice a year.

Also in May, we had pioneering American free improvising saxophonist Jack Wright visit the library, where he talked about his work, his book *The Free Musics* (which is available in Polley), and he performed as well, both solo and in a trio that I ended up playing in along with Lincoln instrument designer Jay Kreimer. There were 15 attendees.

Polley events in June and July (and one in August) featured a series of 5 Music Exploration programs by Music Studio LNK. These took place every other week, and were timed to start after the Stoller Stories events. We had the luck of great weather on all of these dates, and were able to host these in the BMPL courtyard. We had 16 and 19 attendees at the June dates, over 50 on July 10, 35 on July 24th, and 24 at the final August date. These were made possible through a partnership with the Lincoln Arts Council.

We had two more events in August, both of which were in partnership with the Crossroads Music Festival. We hosted their "Baby Concert" on August 4 in our auditorium, which drew 51 engaged visitors, and we held their "Storytelling Slam," which also featured lots of musical elements, on 2nd floor on August 5th, with 24 attendees.

The Polley songwriting/composing club continues to meet monthly. This year, I added one Saturday meeting date each quarter due to patron requests. The number of attendees is still very slowly growing: a couple of months, we only had 1 (this is usually due to weather), though many months we were in the 7-9 attendee range.

Technology/Facilities

Technology and facilities for Polley remained the same this year, but there are discussions toward supplementing the area that could start to move forward in the next fiscal year. As mentioned earlier, I participated in the Local Music Advisory Group throughout the year. While the main focus this year was on the Music Box project, we are also continuing to evaluate plans that will create new music-related amenities near the library, likely along 14th street between O and P streets. There is an overlap between these plans and the Downtown Corridors project, which is continuing to be developed, and the Lincoln Arts Council has been exploring what it would to get some part of these plans designated as a state Creative District. As of the time of this writing, it appears that the Lincoln Arts Council will cease operations in mid-October, but hopefully someone else will pick up this work (as well as the many other fantastic programs they offer).

Plans for FY 2024-25

I plan to continue focusing on both performance and training-oriented Polley events over the next year. This is an area where we can have immediate impact on the music community in Lincoln, providing resources that can't be found elsewhere, while also driving traffic into the Polley area where patrons will find even more useful musical resources.

The Music Box project across the street could have some impact on Polley programming/events in the coming year as well. Once it's open, likely in mid-winter, I'll be able to assess the possibilities with more

precision. The potential for more in-depth music workshops, with relevant equipment available on-site, could make for some valuable experiences for patrons.

While that is being constructed, there is also the possibility of doing something music-related with the training room area located immediately north of the Polley area, in the east wing of BMPL's 2nd floor. This space is rarely used (the most recent use by staff was my Ableton Live software training program with Darren Keen last year), and the concept of converting the space into a recording/video production/makerspace area has been raised. It's not likely that we would be able to fundraise to the level necessary to soundproof the area against extremely loud sources like drum kits and amplifiers, but moderate soundproofing to account for acoustic instruments and electronic music production with headphones should be possible. Expanding hands-on experiences in the library, and providing resources and expertise that might otherwise be cost-prohibitive for many, are great ways to make the Polley Music Library even more meaningful for the community.

Expanding into the east wing of the 2nd floor also gives a poetic symmetry to Lillian Helms Polley's first donation to the library: "In 1966 she gave the Lincoln City Libraries \$12,000 to match a grant of Federal funds. The money was used to finance the building project which added the north and east wings to the two-story Bennett Martin Library and included a space that would become the Polley Music Library." https://www.lincolnlibraries.org/visit/polley-music-library/lillian-helms-polley-and-the-music-of-lincoln/
